These include intervention for identified students, Minilit with Year 2 and Quicksmart numeracy in Year 4. The students enjoy their time learning in a way that helps them when continuing back in the classroom.

Working with Year 3 and 5 students for intervention is both rewarding and impactful. This involves using a diverse range of strategies, from targeted literacy and numeracy exercises to fostering socio-emotional development. Each session presents an opportunity to witness growth and building a supportive environment is key where students feel they can ask questions, make mistakes and celebrate success.

Some of our Year 2 students have been participating in the Minilit program. Minilit is a phonics program that involves a blend of structured activities, interactive story telling and guided reading sessions tailored to the individual needs and interests of each child. Through ongoing assessment and individualised support every student succeeds developing at their own pace.






Assistant Principal Curriculum and Instruction

Hello to the SHP school community. Since my last newsletter report, I have maintained my busyness, working with staff and students. I would like to share with you this week some reading information that you might find useful, and something that you might discuss with your child(ren).

I posed the question, "Why do we read?" to class 4/5 Great Victorians. An interesting question based on the world of technology that we live in. The answers were varied, but all seemed to revolve around 'to learn', and yes, we do need to read to learn, but reading is far more than that.



Here is a quote from Roald Dahl. The author of Charlie and the Chocolate Factory and The Twits, just to name a few of his works. He states that if you want to get anywhere, you have to read.

It is interesting that we are constantly reading, even when we don't realise that we are. Subconsciously we are reading signs around the town, reading prices in the supermarket, reading words as they appear on TV. We are always reading. But where does all this reading get us?

The Great Victorians are having lessons teaching that we read for meaning. If you read and either don't understand what you just read, or you got nothing from it, then maybe that is time that you'll never get back! However, when there is a purpose behind why you are reading, there seems to be a much more focussed approach towards it. The list in the box gives a short list of why we might read.

When reading with your child(ren) it is important that after you have read, that you spend just a short while asking some questions about the book. It can be as simple


Knowledge

as; Did you like this book? Tell me why? Who or what was your favourite character or part of the story. Even asking, would you like to read another story like this, or would you like something different. These simple questions will get your child(ren) thinking and focusing more on the book and then being able to tell you what they gained from it. Remember, don't make it a chore, make it fun!
